





Dianne Boston's Story...

Dianne, a member of our Church, has lived in lots of places in the UK and is glad to have moved back to Yorkshire, to Haxby. She is currently in the process of moving to Durham to be with her family. Esther Horne, 12, asks her to share her story with some excellent questions.

What is your favourite childhood memory?

I was about eight years old and we had a Bible reciting competition at Sunday School. I had had a cold and was slightly deaf. I couldn't hear my own voice but I just belted out the verses. To my surprise I won. Apparently I had the loudest and clearest voice so everyone heard me and voted for me. My prize - a box of jelly babies and a book. (Sweets were a luxury in war time)

Where have you lived?

I have lived in Northampton, Harrogate, Aberystwyth, Cardiff - in Wales, then thankfully home to Yorkshire to live in Haxby. Most of our moves have been unexpected but we (my husband and I) had prayed that God would show us where He wanted us to go. It certainly broadened our knowledge of people in different churches. At the moment I am in the middle of selling my bungalow in Haxby and joining my son and family in Durham.

What are you most proud of?

My loud clear voice, especially as a teacher and then getting older and still having the ability to speak to senior citizens groups about Jesus - when even those on the back row of a meeting couldn't nod off because they could hear my voice!!!

However I think my proudest moment has been when I had sent somebody a postcard of "Jesus the height of the world" - depicting Jesus standing outside our lives waiting to be asked in. The person wrote me a letter to say that as a result of seeing it she had asked Jesus into her life.

Like everybody else I have made mistakes in my life and had difficulties, but if I have helped one person to find Jesus, my life has been worthwhile.

What is your favourite flavour of ice cream?

Orange and passion fruit, sold only in Italy particularly in Venice.

It is evident that Jesus is very prominent in her life and that it is very important to Dianne to try to share His glory with others.

Charlotte Jones, 13, also had some questions for Dianne...

What was your first experience of faith?

Diane has been a religious churchgoer since she was a very young age, as encouraged by her mum. However, her first experience with faith was at the age of 4. Her father was killed during the war as an RAF pilot. A couple of years later (age 4), Diane attended a meeting for widows and children. At the end of the session, the leader of the session taught her and the other children an inspiring lesson: "You may not have a daddy but you have a heavenly father who loves you very much." This taught her that she is a special child of God, that God is a friend and that she doesn't have to resent not hav-(Continued on next page...) ing a dad.

What is your experience working in the church?

As she grew in her faith, Dianne found a passion for working in churches. Before coming to her current church, Dianne and her husband were Sunday school superintendents for the East Harley Methodist. She also led Bible classes at Queens Road Methodist. After working hard in training, Mr and Mrs Boston became marriage and relationship counsellors and held classes to any denominations interested. In those classes, which were predominantly Bible based, she talked to many women in the Cardiff area with various denominations in order to emphasise a personal relationship with Jesus.

How do you hear from God?

Throughout her life, specifically during her teaching career and marriage, Diane has often found that she receives signs from God through the answering her prayers when deciding what school to teach at, moving house, etc.

What is your most inspiring Bible Story?

Dianne admires Jesus's voluntary sacrifice during the crucifixion in order to forgive us of our sins.

Now for the important questions...

- Dianne says that she prefers pancakes over waffles especially with lemon juice and golden syrup.

What is Eco Church?

Eco Church is an award scheme for Churches who want to demonstrate that they take their role as stewards of God's creation seriously. There are 3 levels of award—Bronze, Silver and Gold. Haxby and Wigginton has gained its Bronze award and the team are currently working toward the silver. There are 5 different areas (shown right) and you must obtain the level in all areas to gain the award.

This is more than a tick-box exercise for the team, it is about promoting a way of life that ensures people and the planet thrive, not just today, but always. We recognise that the problems we face today can seem overwhelming. It can seem like 'another thing on our to do list' to be thinking about the planet too. The team wants to make it easier by sharing tips and ideas, recognising that we can only do what we can. We subscribe to the mantra 'progress not perfection!' We can't do everything, all at once, but if we all make small changes, one at a time, it adds up to a lot. There are around 1500 Eco Churches; as a movement, we can have an impact! - 8. Buy presents with purpose: social enterprise do a gift guide for more meaningful gifts:




Young Church decided to have a bit of fun and surveyed the people at Church Breakfast and Young Church to see which animal people would love most.

A young mum came in with a tiny baby, only days old, fast asleep in his buggy. She looked tired, up feeding in the night perhaps, but she wanted to grab a few minutes to herself over lunchtime with some soup and a sandwich. If only the child would stay asleep.

An elderly couple she didn't know followed her in, just for a coffee, and as there was no other space, they asked if they could join her at the low table by the window. They all ordered and were served, and as soon as the mum started to eat, the baby woke up and began to cry. The mum was flustered; the shop was full, the baby was noisy, the soup was going cold. At which point the elderly woman said 'would you like me to take him love while you eat your lunch?' Conversation began between them, the baby went quiet, the lady was thrilled to be able to comfort the child, and the tomato and basil soup was wonderful. A friendship formed, a memory made.



That kind of thing happens in Aroma, and is very much part of the vision of Cameron Stirk, our then minister,15 years ago when the shop opened. He wanted Aroma to be a place of welcome in this community, open to everyone, which demonstrated God's love through service, and which provided an opportunity to learn more about the church and the Christian faith for those who seek it.

My adventure to Norway

My name is Sarah-Jane Uttley, and I have recently received a place on a trip to Roverway, a journey to Norway in summer 2024 with Girlguiding. It was after a long selection process where I was chosen for the trip after a ballot draw and a camp where we completed different activities to see who would be the best fit for each international trip.

Roverway is where Guides and Scouts aged between 16 and 22 years old have the opportunity to come together for a European jamboree. The jamboree is divided into two parts, during the first days, we will gather in smaller groups with other people from several different countries and get the opportunity to explore a self-chosen path. The paths will run throughout Southern Norway and end at the main joint jamboree. The paths will have different themes, and all will get the chance to explore Norway.

Roverway is one of the most popular Guide and Scout events in Europe, with approximately 5000 people taking part. To go on this trip, I need to fundraise to cover the cost of the trip, which is £1995 in total. I am a Young Leader at 1st Rawcliffe Brownies in York and have been a Ranger in Heworth for the past two years. I have been a member of Girlguiding since 2012, at the age of 5 but this is the first time I have been able to go on an international trip with them so it is a very exciting opportunity.


